It offers a “clean start” for individuals typically excluded from the workforce due to limited educational opportunities, criminal records and recent incarceration.

We partner with our employees to help them develop the skills and work history needed to move into permanent, full-time employment. Empowering men to support themselves and their families is a long-term outcome of our efforts.

Is the Cleanstreet pre-work Bible study still going strong?

Yes! The group is very active, and we just finished studying the book of Revelations together. From our group discussions, I know we all left the experience with a fearful respect. Next, we will go back to the beginning, to the book of Genesis, to gain an understanding of how and why Revelation was necessary.

Clean Life/Cleanstreet – A Story of Hope for Those Who Are Stuck



Jerome Edwards grew up on the Westside, the youngest of twelve siblings. After finishing 11th grade at Crane High School, he began experiment-

ing with drugs and illegal activities as a young adult. In 1988, he served three and a half years in prison. Upon release, he returned to drugs and began selling on the street. Again, his actions caught up with him, but this time the penalty was harsher. He was sentenced for 12 years in 1992. Upon his re-release in 1996, something changed – he connected with Cleanstreet. Since then, he’s been on a forward path to stay clean. It’s a journey he’s been on for six years without looking back.

After attending a program for ex-offenders at State Representative Danny Davis’s office, Jerome began to work for Cleanstreet when it was a program of Breakthrough Urban Ministries. When Breakthrough transitioned the ministry of Cleanstreet to Breaking Ground, Jerome came as part of the start up team. He credits his experience with the program as providing a transition to a better life. During his four years at Cleanstreet, he recognized God’s strength as the driving force behind his success. This strength helped him, “hope for the best and stay prayerful,” despite his past or present uncertainty about the future.

Five months ago, Jerome transitioned to Fresh Market Supermarket where he works full time in the meat department and enjoys full benefits. While he is thankful for his new job, he misses the Cleanstreet Bible study and his colleagues. He adds, “Cleanstreet is such a good place to start off – I wish [more] people would come for help.”

He hopes that sharing his story will encourage those who are “stuck” or facing challenges that seem overwhelming. Jerome’s heart to help others succeed is obvious when he says, “I want to reach out to people and help them look to the future. I know from personal experience that you have to want the future to get it.” He adds, “By being responsible and respectable I now have something good to offer. I’m glad to share how I’ve grown, how I’ve changed my life around and become the man I am today...thank you, Jesus, for rescuing me.”
